# Camp-meetings in Central Africa

OUR African believers are campmeeting conscious. It is the great spiritual event of the year to them. Enthusiasm and interest run high. The visiting minister senses this expectation and is moved to give, with the Lord's help, of his very best.

A three-months' tour of Northern Nyasaland and parts of Northern Rhodesia from June to September of last year was a real inspiration to the writer. Being the dry and dusty season of the year there are physical discomforts to endure. Rather than detracting, these discomforts serve rather to deepen one's satisfaction in associating with our missionaries in ministering to our people.

Some might think that these campmeeting trips are pleasure excursions. Nothing could be farther from the truth. The entire time is divided between arduous travel and intensive ministry. On this last trip I attended twelve campmeetings, some of which were followed by short Sabbath School institutes. In all, 122 sermons, Bible studies, and talks were given. These services were of a varied nature. While most were general preaching services, many were given to parents, and others to children separately. The workers and church officers were never forgotten, and the presence of Jesus was especially felt in these services.

The sense of real need rolls upon one's heart such a spirit of prayer and a burden for souls that these meetings cost much. In so many places they were nothing short of heavenly visitations. Multitudes entered into deep and heartfelt reconsecration, many surrendered themselves to accept the Lord Jesus Christ, and numbers of backsliders were reclaimed. These campmeetings all witnessed good baptisms, and closed with a real note of victory and determination to witness for the Lord.

In the Northern Nyasaland area we were taken from place to place by Brother and Sister Crowder. We were also associated with Elder and Mrs. W. L. Davy of Luwazi, Elder and Mrs. A. K. Phillips of Mombera, Brother and Sister Haarhoff of Lake View, Brother and Sister A. V. Bambury, Dr. and Mrs. O. Beardsley, and Nurse M. Johnson of Mwami Mission. These missionaries, along with their many faithful and consecrated African associates, are being blessed with souls in what one would describe as a hard field. These

camp-meetings were held at Saiwa, Tete, Mombera, Luwazi, Nkorongo, and Mwami Missions.

In the Northern Rhodesia Mission Field we made Rusangu Mission our headquarters and were entertained by Brother and Sister W. A. Hurlow, who, with the assistance of Sister C. Stevens, are carrying on an impressive work. From this centre we were accompanied into the bush by Elder A. Bristow, Brother J. Linton, and Brother Hurlow to the various camp-meetings. These meetings were held at Munenga, Nadezwe, Mutana, Sala, Shocombila, and Rusangu. One is impressed by the responsive nature of the people in Northern Rhodesia which might be classified as a promising field.

As most of the camp-meetings were held in the bush, I shall briefly describe one, hoping thus to give to the reader a mental picture of a bush campmeeting. As I write I have in mind Mutama camp-meeting which was visited by Brother J. Linton and myself.

A long motor ride over rough, dusty roads had been followed by a slow trailing of bush paths that finally led us to Mutama after dark. A spontaneous rush and a spirited welcome from African workers and people assured us that we were welcome. A small pole and grass house, along with other conveniences had been prepared for us. It did not take long to put up the camp equipment to the accompaniment of a resounding song service near by. Hastening over to preach, we found a neat enclosure of tall grass under a giant wild fig tree. In this enclosure were about 250 children and juniors on the ground. In addition, there were about 350 adults variously seated either on the ground, logs, benches, or chairs. The singing was overwhelming! were joining in with an enjoyment and abandon that witnessed eloquently to their enthusiasm.

Anyone should be able to preach with persuasive earnestness and convincing power to such an audience! The air, calm and crisp, the stars piercing through the tangled branches and leaves, the up-turned expectant eyes, the human atmosphere at once warm and spontaneous — all these are the setting of a real camp-meeting revival. That night when the meeting closed we knew that God was near, for had we not breathed the Divine breath of the Holy Spirit!

The meetings are shared by Africans and Europeans. There is the early morning consecration service, followed by the workers' meeting, and the eleven o'clock preaching service. After the mid-day meal two services occupy the

afternoon, one departmental, and the other a Bible study. After supper comes the best-attended of all the meetings, when strangers from near-by villages come in, and all huddle together to keep out the cold. Late into the night the little groups camping among the trees under the open sky continue their fireside singing. Like a lullaby it hushes us to peaceful sleep and needed rest.

As the days pass a marked solemnity rests upon all. The climax is the Sabbath morning consecration service. Observant and watchful, deacons seem to hover over the congregation. The sun is hot overhead. There is a seeking out for the shady places; yet none leave. Even the feeding babies in their mothers' arms seem restrained and a reverent hush is upon all during the service. The call is now being made the baptized members all renew their consecration and stand with bowed heads before being seated again. This is followed by the reconsecration of those in the hearers' and baptismal classes. A word of admonition, and they are also seated. The call now sounds forth to those who have once known the Lord but who have fallen by the way. There is a spontaneous response as men and women stand and come forward. The call vearningly lingers, interspersed with song, as friend seeks out friend and decision after decision brings the prodigals to the front, and back to the Father's home.

Now the call widens to those who have never before yielded themselves, and many respond. Singing and calls alternate, and individuals decide for Christ. The consecration prayer follows, in which an entire congregation reaches up to God for grace and power. There is joy in heaven and peace in the consecrated soul.

When the congregation disperses, those who have come forward are tenderly cared for by the district leaders and teachers. Later, while we are at dinner, the evangelist approaches and radiantly announces "Sixteen backsliders reclaimed, and 64 have taken their stand for the first time." How grateful we all are for these precious souls!

That Sabbath afternoon saw a large baptism in the nearby river. As one observed the deacons and deaconesses along with the teachers, evangelists and pastors, one noted that the spirit of revival had matured into a rich satisfaction.

That night the camp-meeting found its climax in the message, "Go home to thy friends, and tell them how great things the Lord hath done for thee."

Most of the senior young people from Port Elizabeth churches attended the Lourensford camp last summer. There they received a new vision and inspiration to study and prepare themselves for better service. Immediately after the camp, they organized a M.V. rally, and conducted a "Share Your Faith" meeting in the city hall. At the time of this rally, a Master Comrade club was formed under the sponsorship of Mrs. Mellett Coetzee, wife of the Cape Conference youth leader.

Some of these girls worked in business offices in the city, and they took their notes with them to study at work. Lunch hours and tea-time breaks were spent studying Denominational History and Bible Doctrines. Very soon their employers and fellow workers were well

informed about Seventh-day Adventists. On the night of the investiture, many of these friends came to witness the testimony of their Adventist associates.

One of the requirements for Master Comrades is to lead a group of Juniors through one of the progressive classes. #### The Kokstad Effort

I ARRIVED in Kokstad, East Griqualand, on February 15, 1949, where Brother Eric Webster had already located. Miss Welman, our Bible instructor arrived two days later. Great plans were drawn up for an interesting campaign. We spent several days looking for accommodation, and met several rebuffs in the process. One of these was delivered with such apostolic fervour, that I thought I had defeated our purpose by seeking a place to lay my head. We made out a case history of the town, but this proved to be more of a "case" than "history."

We did not realize the extent of the opposition that developed, even before we started our meetings, until we tried to find someone to play the piano in the town hall. We approached every pianist and organist of whom we learned, but all refused to assist us on instructions from the local clergy. There were five of these gentlemen, each with his little flock of twenty or thirty. Most of them did not know why they opposed us. They had just heard something. A revival campaign was in progress in one of the churches, which was awkward for our plans. We had almost reached the stage of complete frustration when we discovered a musician a lady with a very young baby. She was a Roman Catholic. Would she play for us? Yes, I'll play for you. What would you like? Uke, accordion, banjo, piano? Anything you like." We said the piano was sufficient.

The opening night came at last — February 22, 1949. I shall never forget it. Had I been preaching on the subject of the Flood, it might have been appropriate. Nearly two inches of rain fell during the time the people should have been coming to the meeting. The attendance was painfully small. The next night there was more rain, and the attendance was less than the first night. This went on for two weeks, till we felt like closing down. However, in spite of torrential rains and small audiences, we called for names and began visiting. The people were friendly enough, but very cautious and non-committal. After three months there seemed no hope of our ever baptizing a soul in Kokstad.

We had friendly neighbours. One of these was a Baptist minister, who was also an evangelist. Somehow this very kind, Christian gentleman seemed to be in sympathy with us. I soon learned the reason. He had been in Kokstad for two years, and had not won a single soul, either white or black in that time. We could not believe that the good

Lord would allow us to have a similar humiliating experience. Our friend soon sold up and left the town, and we were sorry to see him go. He was not one of the five opponents of our work, for there is no Baptist church in Kokstad.

We called on the people and prayed with them. We sold them our books and handed out papers, until the town and district were saturated with our literature. A number of earnest souls began taking Bible studies. A change was coming over Kokstad. Seven souls were borne daily before the throne of grace. Seven souls have been added to the church. This last warning message cannot be crushed. It is God's truth. In Kokstad it has triumphed.

I have appreciated the workers associated with me in this remote East Griqualand town. Their labours were successful while they were with us there, and we valued their loyal support. We pray that the little company in Kokstad will be remembered in your prayers, since they are now left unshepherded, and earnestly hope that still others from those parts will soon be added to the ranks of God's remnant people.

### Seed Sowing

We believe the best method which has ever been given to the church for sowing Gospel seed is that of securing names of persons to take the Voice of Prophecy Bible lessons. The Cape Field worker who recently went to St. Helena set himself the aim of securing a thousand enrolments on that island as quickly as possible, so as to prepare the ground for his public meetings. On this island, where nothing has been done before to teach this Message, he has already secured 700 enrolments, and we understand has had his first baptism.

In all our cities, young people should organize as bands of workers to go out and hold meetings in the open air during the summer months, either on the beaches, in the parks, or in public places where they can attract the public. If they would do this, thousands of enrolments could be secured. Here is a means by which all our young people

may be "sharing their faith" in a very practical way.

The more we advertise the Voice of Prophecy Bible School, and the better it becomes known, the more the people want to study these lessons. Don't be afraid to acquaint everyone with the work of the Voice of Prophecy and invite them to take these lessons. Hundreds—and now we can say thousands—have signed the cards on Sabbath decision and requests for baptism.

Our Prayer Circle is meeting with good success also. Recently some encouraging experiences have come to us. #### Books

PAUL, being a learned Pharisee, and a member of the Sanhedrin, had, no doubt, the privilege of acquiring a private library. In his day, books were usually handwritten on parchment scrolls or papyrus sheets. He was, apparently, the possessor of some valuable and rare books, for he specially requested Timothy to bring them to him when he was a prisoner in Rome. (2 Tim. 4: 11.) Those books had been written and bound by hand, for it is only since the end of the sixteenth century that the art of printing has been used in western lands. How great an advance there has been in the art and science of printing in our day can be realized when we think that anybody can now afford to own the most precious books, whereas in Paul's day, only the rich and scholarly could do so.

Prophecy has foretold the increase of knowledge in the last days. The printing press today holds the most important place in the dissemination of knowledge to the peoples of the earth. All the different fields of study, and the arts and sciences are taught through the medium of books.

God's messages to the world have kept pace with the rapid strides of modern progress, and have made use of these advances to spread the knowledge of God. The millions of Bibles which are circulated to all the nations of earth each year testify to this. If we add to this number the many millions more of books and periodicals dealing with the Scriptures, we begin to see how the Lord's commission in Matthew 24: 14 is being fulfilled.

From the pen of inspiration comes the following: "Our publishing houses are God's appointed centres, and through them is to be accomplished a work, the magnitude of which is yet unrealized."

— Testimonies, vol. 7, page 144. That our publishing institutions are doing the work commanded of God, will not be disputed. The question that does arise is, "Are the members of our churches doing their part to accomplish the Lord's commission to the church?"

The canvassing of our books and papers to the people has been ordained of God. "This is the very work the Lord would have His people do at this time."—Colporteur Evangelist, page 5.

One of the functions of the publishing department is to counsel and help those who are willing to obey God's call. They are taught to meet the people, to present our literature acceptably, and in so doing, to bring the Lord's last message of hope to a doomed world. Success through the assistance of heavenly agencies is promised to the consecrated canvasser for God. #### Gains in Membership

It always cheers our hearts to know that the work of the Lord is onward. What are ordinary dry figures becomes a thrilling story when they record the progress of the Advent movement in this, our land. Just look at the gains in membership during the past five years.

These figures are taken from the annual report made up at the end of the second quarter of each year. When the full reports for 1949 are rendered, we know that this year will have proved the best in our history in soul winning.

#### 1,000 Baptisms in One Area

THE Kisii Mission covers comparatively a small area in East Africa. Brother K. G. Webster is in charge. He reports that just over one thousand baptisms have already taken place at this mission during this year.

#### Over 8,000 Baptisms

THE report for the quarter ending June 30 of this year indicates that over 8,000 persons were baptized into the truth during the preceding twelve monhts. This figure represents an increase of over 1,100 over the previous year.

#### News Notes

Many things have happened here at headquarters since the last issue of the Outlook came from the press. We wish we could share with our readers all of the encouraging reports that were given and all of the important recommendations and resolutions that were taken to extend the cause of God. Unfortunately space will not permit a full report, but we will give you some insight into what was done and the fruitage of the actions taken will be apparent as the months of 1950 go by.

Two important gatherings met in the Division office during December. The first was a medical council with representatives of our medical work from all parts of the Division; the second, the annual year-end meeting of the Division Executive Committee.

#### **BAPTISMS FOR 1949**

Reports given at the time of the Division year-end committee meeting indicate that approximately 11,500 precious souls will have been baptized into this message during 1949. In addition to those baptized, over 20,000 persons have joined the Bible classes.

#### 1.535 EVANGELISTIC EFFORTS

What a wonderful record! How our hearts thrill at the news that during 1949 1,535 evangelistic efforts were held throughout the Division. Many of these efforts were small; many of them were large. Some were held by laymen; many were held by the regular working force.

#### South East African Union

The South East African Union reports 6,000 in the Bible classes and

9,000 church members. These members and believers are united in approximately fifty churches and companies.

#### Zambesi Union

During 1949 the Zambesi Union reports the holding of 58 camp-meetings with over 27,000 in attendance, and camp-meeting offerings amounting to £1,773. The same union held 99 evangelistic efforts in which 192 laymen and 179 workers joined their forces. 2,965 converts joined the baptismal classes as a result of these efforts. The expense involved in connection with these efforts beyond the salaries and expense of the workers amounted to £264.

#### The Congo Union Report


As at the end of 1949, the Congo Union is operating twelve mission stations including two hospitals and two training schools. Their European staff numbers 37 and their African staff 583. The baptized membership is 11,396. 1,576 new believers were baptized during the year. Over 39,000 persons are in the Bible classes.

#### The Angola Union

The Angola Union has a church membership of 3,818. There are 6,455 Sabbath-keepers. During 1949 700 persons were added to the Bible classes. At the beginning of the year the union set a goal for 600 baptisms. By the end of November, 609 had been baptized.

#### The South African Union

The membership of the South African Union now stands at 10,268. Baptisms for the first nine months of 1949 totalled 942. Of these 459 were European, 170 from the Cape Field, and 313

from the two Bantu mission fields. The tithe from the European membership for ten months of 1949 totalled £56,554, from the Cape Field £8,754, and from the African believers £3,829.

#### East African Union

There are 768 workers employed in the East African Union. There are 112 organized churches. At present there is a baptized membership of 18,112, but the total number keeping the Sabbath is 34,758. During 1949 3,716 souls were baptized. At present there are over 16,000 in the baptismal classes.

# BRINGING VISITORS TO SABBATH-SCHOOL

During the third quarter of 1949 almost 55,000 visitors were brought to the Sabbath-school by Sabbath-school members of the Congo Union. We feel like saying to all our members everywhere, "Go thou, and do likewise."

#### A LARGE MEDICAL WORK

The medical report for the month of September, 1949, for the Congo Union reveals that 41,472 first visits by patients were made to our hospitals and dispensaries.

#### THE STUDENT BODY

The students attending denominational schools in the Southern African Division represent 35 per cent of the entire enrolment in denominational schools throughout the world. This is indeed a remarkable record.

#### GOALS FOR SOULS

The following goals were set for converts and baptisms by the various unions during 1950:

Let us all join in prayer that these goals will be realized in the great forward advance that is planned for the church.

WE are sure our people will be interested in seeing a picture of one of our large native camp-meetings. Pictures appear elsewhere in this issue giving an idea of the camp-meeting held at Nyanchwa Mission, Kenya Colony, where over 8,000 people were in attendance. During the consecration service on the Sabbath of the camp-meeting, 148 persons accepted Christ as their Saviour and joined the Bible Class. There were over one hundred baptized during the meetings.

#### MEDICAL COUNCIL

During the Medical Council the objectives of our medical work were set forth as follows:

- 1. To extend the message.
- 2. To spread the gospel of health.
- 3. To train medical workers.
- 4. To measure up to the highest standards in service.
- 5. To provide suitable buildings and equipment in which service can be rendered.

Onder die bakkende hemel het Leraar De Beer, Broeders Ansley en Engelbrecht en 'n naturelle predikant die droë omgewing van The Willows voor hulle sien opdoem. Die hele omgewing het daar tragies uitgesien. Die enigste groenigheid wat die oog kon bespeur, was die blare aan die bome en hier en daar 'n lappie groen koring. Daar was glad geen gras te sien op die plek waar die kampvergadering moes plaasvind nie.

Hy het die aanwesige soekers tot 'n besluit gebring. Die kerkie was al van hoek tot kant vol toe kom daar nog steeds ander aan. Die kinders is naderhand uitgeroep om voor die preekstoel op die vloer te kom sit; die gangetjies tussen die banke was vol, en eindelik het die tuislede opgestaan en hulle sitplekke aan die besoekers gegee, maar die kerkie was nog te klein om daardie hele gehoor te bevat.

Dit was ook ons voorreg om Leraar W. E. Read, rondreisende sekretaris van die Wêreldkonferensie, by ons te hê, en sy preke en Bybelstudies het ons met moed vervul sowel as om ons liefde en vasberadenheid om die Here te dien, te versterk. Ander werkers wat gehelp het met die inwydingsdiens was Inboorlingleraars B. T. Scott, S. K. Ntwana, D. D. Ntsikeni en die president van die veld. # Berig uit St. Helena

In 'n brief wat ons onlangs uit St. Helena van Leraar P. H. Campher ontvang het, skryf hy dat hy op Sondag, 30 Oktober, sy eerste doopdiens in Jamestown sou hou. Hy deel ons mee dat vyf persone gedoop sal word en dat drie wat voorheen Baptiste was, op belydenis van geloof by die kerk sal aansluit.

Dit is nie alleenlik Broeder Campher se eerste doopdiens op St. Helena nie, dit is ook die eerste Adventiste doopdiens wat ooit daar gehou is. Dit is 'n stap vorentoe, en ons meen dat dit 'n voorteken is van groot dinge wat nog moet gebeur. Hierdie agt siele is die eerste vrugte van die poging wat Broeder Campher gehou het nadat hy in Aprilmaand daar aangekom het.

Toe hulle daarheen is, het ons die gesin Campher gesê om in die begin maar stadig te werk en om eers die mense se vertroue te wen voordat hulle 'n openbare poging aanpak. Maar sodra hulle daar aangekom het, wou die mense 'n poging hê. Hy het 'n kabelgram gestuur om raad te vra, en ons het hom laat weet om maar aan te gaan.

Dit het natuurlik nie alles voor die wind gegaan nie. Daar was, soos gewoonlik die geval is, sommer gou-gou teenstand. Sommige mense wat beter behoort te weet, het probeer om sake vir ons werkers moeilik te maak en het selfs geweier om aan sommige wat die dienste bygewoon het, hulle gewone toelaes te

Die bewoners van St. Helena is opreg, eerlik en ernstig, maar omdat daar min nywerhede is, het hulle nie veel kans om 'n bestaan te maak nie. Hulle is dus maar behoeftig en dit ontbreek hulle aan baie lewensbenodighede.

Ons het onlangs vier groot negosiekiste vol klere en Bybels daarheen gestuur. Daarmee sal Broeder en Suster Campher heelwat noodlenigingswerk kan doen. Baie gesinne sal beide stoflike en geestelike seëninge ontvang. Ons lede in die Kaapse Veld, en sommige Blankes ook, het ons goed tot hulp gesnel toe ons om klere en Bybels gevra Ons waardeer hierdie vrygewigheid. Ons wil die Dorkasfederasie van die Kaapse Veld ook bedank vir die tyd en geld wat hulle bestee het aan verpakking en verskeping van hierdie goedere. Broeder Campher deel ons mee dat hy reeds baie Bybels uitgedeel het en nog vyftig het om aan ander behoeftiges te gee.

·Meer as sewehonderd name is aan die Stem-van-Profesie gestuur, en ons glo dat baie van hierdie persone later gedoop sal word. Die lig skyn nou op St. Helena en daar is 'n nuwe lied en goeie moed in die harte van diegene wat op daardie eensame eilandjie in die Suid-Atlantiese Oseaan woon.

### "Die Engel van die Here Trek 'n Laer . . . en Red"

HIERDIE bekende, bemoedigende belofte in Psalm 34: 8 het aan die lede van die Kaapse Veld gemeente in Durban nuwe moed en vertroue gebring.

Broeder en Suster G. Beyers wat toesig hou oor die Mooreweggemeente, het 'n nuwe manier van evangelisasie aangepak. Dit is onmoontlik om 'n saal te huur, maar dit het ons werkers in Natal nie gehinder nie. Saam met 'n aantal lede van die gemeente het hulle "woonstel pogings" aan die gang gesit. Nadat hulle verlof verkry het om in die gronde van 'n blok woonstelle van vier of výf verdiepings dienste te hou, gaan hulle as volg te werk: Hulle hou 'n sangdiens, en sodra die mense op hulle balkonne begin uitkom, gooi Broeder Beyers prente op die doek en gee hy sy lesing. Die eerste reeks was heeltemal geslaagd.

'n Tweede reeks is by 'n tweede blok

woonstelle gehou, en alles het goed gegaan totdat Broeder Beyers die redes vir die verandering van die Sabbat voorgedra het. 'n Aantal van die hoorders het daar baie duidelik oor aanstoot geneem. Een vrou het ons broeder begin toesnou en uitskel, en eerlank was daar 'n groep gereed om haar te help. Ons broeder het maar aangehou tot aan die einde van sy lesing, maar na die einde van die diens het 'n woedende bende hom byna molesteer.

'n Paar dae daarna het iemand wat vriendelik was, die werkers gewaarsku om geen verdere dienste te hou nie, want hy het gehoor dat sommige van die mense 'n saamswering teen hulle saamsmee. Die plan was om die projeksielantern en die motorkarre te vernietig en die broeders dan persoonlik aan te rand. Broeder Beyers het die broeders van die gemeente byeengeroep en hulle het die saak bespreek. Hulle eerste mening was dat dit nie verstandig sou wees om ten spyte van die waarskuwing 'n verdere diens te hou nie. Maar daar het toevallig net met daardie tyd in die Kaapse Veldse blaadjie, die Clarion, 'n artikel verskyn waarin gesê is dat die werk onder groot verdrukking klaargemaak sal moet word. Ons lede het nie geweet wat hulle moes doen nie, maar hulle het oor die saak gebid. Nadat hulle gebid het, het hulle besluit om die Sondagnamiddag voordat die diens gehou sou word na die woonstelle te gaan en by elke woonstel 'n eksemplaar van Present Truth aan te bied. Dit sou hulle dan kans gee om uit te vind wat die houding van die mense was. Toe Broeder Beyers uit sy kar klim, het hy hom byna vasgeloop teen die vrou wat die moeilikheid opgestook het. Hy en een van die broeders het haar toe genader, 'n blad aangebied en om verskoning gevra omdat sy lesing vir haar aanstootlik was. Die vrou was baie verleë, en sy het haar kop laat sak.

Daarop het sy dieselfde mense wat ons werkers bedreig het, bymekaargeroep. Hulle was bedaard en vriendelik en het versoek dat die dienste verder voortgesit moes word. Hulle het mekaar die hand gegee, en ons broeders is daar weg met dankbaarheid vir die beskerming van God. Die dienste word op ordelike wyse voortgesit.

Broeder Beyers het onlangs geskryf dat alles nou weer goed gaan. Hy sê: "Die vrou wat voorheen die voorbok was, het nou die sleutel geword. Sy moedig die ander nou almal aan om te sing. Wie weet of God haar nie soos die Samaritaanse vrou uitverkies het om die waarheid aan haar mense te bring nie?"

Meer mense is belangstellend, en in

hierdie plek waar 'n storm kon ontstaan het as God Sy engele nie gestuur het om 'n laer te trek nie, is die mense begerig om die waarheid te hoor.

Broeder Beyers het in November 'n doopdiens gehou. Dertien persone is gedoop, een van hulle 'n Indiër vir wie Broeder Lindup gewerk het.

"Aan God sy die ere, groot dade doen Hy."

Die meeste van diegene wat gedoop is, was die vrugte van die poging wat Leraar J. van de Merwe onlangs in die Brakpanse stadsaal gehou het.




